FROM THE PRESIDENT



As many of you will already know, Michael Meade has decided that it's time to move on from his role as our Club's President. This decision was announced at the AGM last year and I've been asked, and have agreed to take over from Michael. However, I'm pleased to say that Michael's considerable talent and experience will not be lost to us, as he has generously agreed to continue on the Club's Board for the time being and to provide mentorship as I learn the ropes. There's some mighty big shoes to fill but I'll do my best.

I'm sure you will all join me in thanking Michael for his excellent leadership and considerable hard work in steering the Club through some very tumultuous times. Despite the many challenges faced, Michael, in

his time as President, has been instrumental in effecting many valuable changes. We've seen improvements around the clubhouse thanks to various grants and the contributions of our member volunteers, and a rebranding of the Club name and logo. There are several further projects, which are not quite complete, but have been driven hard by Michael over the past year. Such as our new website and club signage, both of which we hope to finalise in the next month or so. Michael can be justifiably proud of his contribution to the Club. I understand that part of the reason for moving on relates to travel commitments and a desire to focus more on his golf. So watch out if you encounter him in the match play he's now on a new mission !!!

Looking forwards, we can expect some interesting times ahead. I expect the Club that we enjoy now will look and feel quite different in three - five years' time. The future is not certain especially with the prospect of the "on again" Council merger of Hunters Hill, Lane Cove and Ryde. However, I'm committed to ensuring that the core element of our golfing facilities and course access will remain essentially the same if not better. Again, it's up to us as members to make full use of the available access. If Council see the course being fully utilised, then it's much harder for them to argue for modifications to our Block Booking arrangements. Studies show that if you play more golf then your golf improves, so there's even more reason to get out there. On that particular point, I'm very much in favour of negotiating improved terms for members to access the course outside of our Block Booking arrangements to allow for practice or a quick 3, 6, 9 or 18 holes during the week. I note that this type of "Gold or Platinum" Membership concept has been presented to Council before but was ultimately placed in the "Too Hard" basket. I would be very interested to gauge the level of support amongst our current membership. (Continued over)

As Michael mentioned in his last *Links* (Feb 2017), we received a rapid response to the Board's letter outlining concerns with respect to the lease negotiations. The proposed follow up meeting scheduled for February has not yet occurred but we have received some encouraging positive support, which is much appreciated. I sincerely hope that by the next *Links* issue in April, I will be able to report some positive outcomes in this regard. Also on a positive note, the Fourth (4th Hole) Bridge Replacement work commenced on February 20. Work will be carried out Monday to Friday for 4 - 6 weeks and the 4th hole will be out of play on week day times for that period. Hopefully the construction process will be conducted without incident, unlike the Forth Bridge (Scotland), which sadly claimed the lives of 50 or more workers. As a civil engineer myself, I suspect that the 4-6 week time frame is an exercise in setting expectations, and with luck and some more good weather we may be enjoying our new bridge access much sooner.

Well done to all those who braved the elements and completed their games. THE BRIDGE ON THE 4TH



Short time pain for long time gain as the old bridge on the 4th/13th was dismantled, cut up and carried away.

Those who saw this process in the last week were intrigued by the variety of materials that had been used on the old bridge construction.

The bridge has a special place in the history of the development of the course. Together with the rest of the course, it was built by members, something that is sometimes forgotten in discussions about the future of the course and the Club itself.

The bridge scanning the gully was constructed from materials that were scavenged from a number of sources by founding member Arch McKinnon.

These materials included:

- * Old railway lines and four stanchions from the cableway used to carry sand and gravel to Warragamba Dam during its construction
- * Over 90 metres of old boiler piping
- * Miscellaneous second hand angled material
- * Boarding on the footway, which was the only material purchased.

Apart from hiring a crane for the erection, most of the work was done by members on a voluntary basis.

The picture above shows the bridge soon after construction, with the newly built 4th hole in the background. Note the bunkers, four or five of them on the front and side of the green. Even the grass for this hole was recycled, collected from a nearby bowling club which was returfing its greens. I think we should all be thankful that those bunkers disappeared when the hole was rebuilt later.

Let us hope that the dimensions of the replacement bridge are such that it is wide enough to allow for single seater motorised buggies to be used on the course, something that we have been trying to arrange with the Council since such a buggy was trialled on the course in June 2015.

It is expected that the new bridge will be in place in 4-6 weeks time. Any questions you have about it can be addressed to Hamish Anderson. It must be the engineer in him, as Hamish has taken a special interest in the bridge replacement. The picture above was sourced from our archival material held in Lane Cove Library, part of the collection of our 50th anniversary material. If you are in the last couple of groups, please do not sit down and have a drink before completing your scoring duties. You must complete your scores and enter them into One Golf and the board ASAP.

This allows the member on duty to complete the presentation soon after the last group finishes. Nothing better than a full house for the presentation. Some great stories are told at this time.



To all the Wednesday golfers, the new temporary course is now in operation while the bridge replacement takes place. Hopefully it will only be necessary for 4 - 6 weeks.

One thing. When you are playing the 3rd / 12th hole take your clubs with you to the green. When you finish the 3rd / 12th continue walking down to the 4th tee and out onto Dorritt Street to get to the 5th tee. I've seen quite a few members leave their clubs at the 3rd tee, walk back from the green to the 3rd tee, continue on past the 2nd green and up to the 5th tee.

This is very unsafe and the practice must be discontinued. This practice slows down the field as players on the 3rd have to wait for others to move out of the way before teeing off and you may also be hit by players hitting their 2nd (or 3rd or 4th) shots to the 2nd green. Overall it probably saves only 40 metres.

Please don't forget the **Men's Presentation Night** on 11th March. Come along and celebrate the winners of 2016.

Finally someone asked me the other day, "Whose honour is it?" I said mine (match play excluded), because I was at the tee first!!! You want the honour, get to the tee first. Again, saved heaps of time! Farewell until next month

BALLS! DID YOU KNOW...?

- Golf balls were originally made of wood. Later, they were made from boiled feathers stuffed into stitched leather known as "featheries".
- 2 The modern, and cheaper golf ball, filled with gutta-percha, was not developed till 1848.
- Balls travel significantly further on hot days. A golfer swinging at around 160kph will carry the driver up to seven to eight metres longer for each increase in temperature of 25 degrees.
- 4 Approximately 20 million golf balls are lost in water hazards in the UK each year.
- 5 Golfers use an estimated \$800 USD million worth of golf balls annually.



SO, YOU THINK YOU KNOW THE RULES - NO 1

Rules to help your game on our course, in four easy lessons

HOLES 1(10) and 2 (11)



SCENARIO - Ball is in hazard to left of fairway

(RULE 26 Lateral Water Hazard pp 112 -115)

OPTIONS

1 Play the ball as it lies (not grounding club, not moving loose impediments).

Under penalty of 1 stroke, replay a ball from the spot where the original ball was last played ("stroke and distance").

3 Under penalty of 1 stroke drop a ball outside the hazard within 2 club lengths of the point where the original ball last crossed the margin of the water hazard.
