EARLY HISTORY OF THE CLUB; Part 1 COURSE CONSTRUCTION.

In the early fifties members of the Riverview Golf Club were advised that their Landlord, St Ignatius College, would not renew their lease as the College wanted the land to build a new Preparatory School and also to develop some of the land for housing to help pay for the new school.

There followed a series of meetings both public and with Council with the intention of building a new golf course in Lane Cove. Several of the members of the Riverview Club were active in this drive and none more so than Ron and Isabel Goulding. Their efforts were rewarded with Council accepting the concept and assisting in holding some public meetings. The interest generated encouraged those involved to form a steering committee at about 1960 and at a meeting held in the then Masonic Hall, the first elected committee was formed.

After the election of the first committee they quickly moved into action. One of the first decisions was to form a number of sub-committees to better handle the range of activities that had to be initiated. Committees formed included Course and Greens (Construction), Bowls and Finance. Jim White was president for the first five years, Arch McKinnon was secretary and Jim Cowell was treasurer. The latter two were Councillors.

In 1960, the centre of the Board's concerns was, of course, the course construction. The Club was lucky to have as a member, Ted Cogan, a builder with many years of experience, to head the Course Committee. He was determined, willing to give much of his time to the task (of course construction), so the committee knew what it wanted and saw that it happened. He went to great lengths to get things done within budget. Ted was also a very good golfer with experience of playing on many courses. There were many difficulties presented by the site and terrain, but Ted was able to use his knowledge of golf and golf courses to the full.

The initial concentration was on that part of the land now occupied by the 1st, 7th, 8th and 9th fairways,

all on the south side of Richardson Street. A great deal of filling was brought in (largely from the Shell Oil Company and other demolition sites). Much of the creek, flowing down the middle of the area, was piped and covered to both raise and widen the fairways. When this area had been filled, 9 short holes were established.

A green keeper was employed from about mid-1963 and he was given the cottage as his residence as part of his pay packet. For the first year or so, the course was played



with little grass on the fairways, so teeing up was compulsory. Regular working bees had to be held to clear away the hundreds of stones that had to be removed before mowing was possible. Gradually the new grass grew, was mown and started to make the stretches of earth look like real fairways.

In the meantime, the committee shifted attention to the northern side of Richardson Street where the same pattern of construction was followed. The second hole was made much as it is today, but the 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th, were all, at first, basically par threes with, as before, tees and greens separated by bare fairways or a steep gulley with a bridge to walk over. As each hole approached completion, a tee and green was removed from the "short course" and was re-established on the new fairway. By mid 1964, golf was played on the extended course. *To be continued next month*

WORN LIPS:

A problem with the new flagstick rule?

Below is a letter that appeared in the July issue of Inside Golf. It refers to what would seem to be an unintended result of the new rule. Has anyone noticed the same thing on our course?

"Since the new "Flagstick in" rule was implemented, I have noticed that the cup lips have started to be worn down/blunted/collapsed. I shared this observation with my playing partners and they too had noticed the deterioration.



My guess is that players, in retrieving their balls, are not removing the flagstick. Instead, they force their hands between stick and cup wall, grasp the ball, pull it out and, as a result, are fouling/collapsing the cup lip.

While some might say this is a very good as it will fall easier into the hole rather than thumb-nail past it, I do think that it might be giving our course superintendents another worry.

Even if it isn't explicitly stated, it would seem to be simple good manners to remove the stick when recovering your ball, to help maintain the cups. "
