EARLY DAYS -

The Club's original newsletter, The Gumnut, first appeared in October 1966. At nearly the same time, the Club opened the extended course layout. On 10 September that year, the final 32-par layout was made available for play for the first time. Thus ended the overall golf course plan, which commenced over ten years earlier. It was at this time that the layout, almost as we know it today, was completed. Current members owe a deep debt of gratitude to those pioneers who had the foresight and commitment to build the magnificent green course that we all enjoy today. **The Editor**

FROM THE GUMNUT, Volume 1, No, 1, October 1966

In 1964, the Club opened a short 27-par layout on a section of the course, which is now occupied by three holes and one bowling green. Earlier that year, this layout was amended by adding two new holes north of Richardson Street, a par 4 and a par 3. The par rating was increased to 29.

However, because of the way the Board of Directors had to open this section, considerable problems were encountered and members were obliged to play on a rough, incomplete layout involving considerable walking and climbing. The majority of members were prepared to accept this temporary measure.

Now, a little over two years since the original commencement of play, the final scheme has been achieved. In these last two years we have succeeded in more than doubling the area of the course.

For many months members have been wondering about odd bits of work here and there, but gradually the pieces of construction began to knit together and the result is now evident.



It is pleasing to hear the many comments made by members, which confirm that the final layout is a great improvement; a real golf course and a joy to all.

The Golf Association committee has inspected the new layout and have expressed surprise at the progress made in such a short time. They are very pleased with the new holes, apart from a few minor exceptions, which we know about and have planned to remedy when finance becomes available.

The new holes provide many new challenges. Below Richardson Street there was not one bunker. Now there are 13 and several more are planned for key positions. The new fairways are wider; there are fewer hazards, easier rough, bigger greens and more character. Despite this the holes are not easy.

The **second hole** has been in use since the beginning of the year and until such time as the narrow section is filled, it will present a real test of accuracy. (*Continued over*)

Third hole is a semi blind hole with only the top of the flagstick visible. (This will become visible when the tee is extended back further at a later date). It is an uphill shot, is quite simple and should become the easiest hole on the card.

The **fourth hole** was subject to considerable controversy during its construction because of the bridge location, bunkers, trees and proposed two level green. However, everyone now agrees this is the best hole on the course.

The **fifth hole** is the one which will really give the player latitude when properly grassed. In the middle it is 70 yards wide and enables golfers to "have a go".

The **sixth hole** is a real hit or miss shot, a kidneyshaped green with plenty of room on the green but almost none behind. Six feet too long and you can forget your shot.

The **seventh hole**, which now combines two old ones, presents a problem because of its width and length. Several adjustments will be made to this hole. In the meantime, it requires two cautious iron shots.



The **eighth hole** now becomes a dogleg and what a mess some people are getting into by having a lash instead of taking things easy.

The members of the course and greens committee take this opportunity of thanking the many members for their remarks on the new layout and to the greens staff, headed by Mr Arthur Partridge, for the excellent work during a most difficult 12 months.

Another big day approaching is our annual Legacy





GOLF NSW: ROADSHOW REPORT

On Monday, 9 September, as the Lane Cove GC delegate, I attended the GOLF NSW Roadshow at Pymble GC. During the last few years these information days have been held annually at various golf clubs throughout NSW. Some of the information that really interested me was: -

1. World Handicapping System

This will come into force in 2020 and the good part is, that the Slope system which is used by Australia, will now be used worldwide. There will be a few changes, including the Daily Rating going to Playing Conditions Calculation (PCC) and the maximum handicap going to 54!



2. Play 9

GA will once again stage a celebration of 9-hole golf during

the 2019 Australian Open. Four players from NSW/ACT will have a chance to play 9 holes on the Saturday evening of the Open. Any 9-hole competition scores processed into Golf Link will be placed in the draw.

3. Marketing

The importance of having a good website, communication and use of social media were all highlighted. It was pointed out that the culture of the club, from office, bar staff, members, Pro Shop and green staff all influence the culture of the club and how people view the club. First Impressions and how welcome visitors are made to feel are very important.

4. Get into Golf for Women

Women membership is declining in a lot of clubs and they are not attracting new members. A pilot program will start late 2019, run along the same line as the Seniors program, with similar marketing and promotion. Clubs can apply now if interested in the pilot program.
