FROM THE BOARD

We wish to advise that Alan Moss has resigned as President and Director of the Lane Cove Golf Club. We wish to thank Alan for his leadership over the last three years.

Alan has resigned as he has a business relationship with a Lane Cove Councillor and did not want this to impact on the Club's dealings with Council concerning the precinct development.

Dermot Duncan has agreed to fill the position of President with the vacant Director position to be filled at the AGM.

Many of you will be aware that Lane Cove Council (LCC) has commenced the community consultation process for the proposed re-development of the clubhouse, tennis facilities and associated car parking areas.

The current LCC proposal is very different from the extent of works discussed and agreed by the Recreational Precinct Advisory Committee (RPAC) and does not comply with the terms expressed in the LCC Expression of Interest which required the development to maintain a Par 64 golf course on the existing footprint. The new proposal removes holes 8/17 and 9/18 entirely and replaces them with a driving range and an 18 hole mini-golf course. In addition the first tee will be moved forward and will include an integrated practice putting green, thus shortening this hole.

If this proposal goes ahead it will have a devastating impact on the course and our members. We have therefore commenced a Petition to the Legislative Assembly and urge **EVERY MEMBER** to obtain as many signatures as possible so that we can demonstrate significant opposition to this proposal. If every member could obtain about 100 names for the Petition it would go a long way towards saving the golf course we know and love so much. Copies of the Petition are available in the clubhouse and they should be returned by Friday 31 July.

On this important issue, directors Barbara Oliver and Dermot Duncan, addressed the Greenwich Community Association (GCA) meeting held at the Club on 1 July, where they highlighted the lack of consultation in the whole process. The GCA meeting passed a motion demanding that Council engage in genuine consultation and engagement with stakeholders. The GCA was also concerned about the lack of detail in relation to the costing and funding of the proposal. (*Continued over*)

We are also in communication with the Mayor, who is also Patron of our Club, and her fellow Councillors.

Council has prepared a video in support of the precinct project and this can be seen on Council's website http://www.lanecove.nsw.gov.au/CouncilConsultations/Pages/SportandRecreationPrecinct.aspx.

On this website there is also an online survey, which members can use to express their thoughts on the proposed changes to the golf course, as well as other documents which are of interest.

Of particular benefit would be if all members emailed their objections to the General Manager at gm@lanecove.nsw.gov.au with a copy to (cc) lcccgolf@bigpond.net.au.

David Stevens, Manager Commercial Operations, accompanied by others, will be at the Club at 9.00 am through to 11.30 am on Saturday 25 July and Saturday 1 August to answer questions and elaborate on the project. It would be good if as many members as possible could be in attendance.

If anyone has additional ideas to help in the fight against Council's changed proposal please let us know.

Finally, some really good news, functions are slowly coming back to the Club. Under current guidelines we can have 50 guests so a number of events have been held since restrictions were eased.



Moving right along to the 5th Major!


This Year the Foursomes was played under two rounds of stroke which can be very challenging. Players often are put in places on the course by their partners that they have never been before!

ALL YOU WANTED OR NEED TO KNOW ABOUT GOLF BALLS PART 1

How many dimples on a golf ball?

The truth is, there is not a single answer to this question. That's because the number of dimples varies depending on the model and manufacturer. Most often the number of dimples per golf ball falls somewhere between 300 and 500. For example, the 2017/18 model of the Titleist Pro V1 has 352 dimples, while their flagship ball from the same year, Pro V1x, has 328 dimples. For one manufacturer, the answer to the question was a whopping 1,070, which happens to be the record for the most dimples on a golf ball.

Having caught your attention, the next question I am sure you want answered is why do golf balls have dimples? Golf manufacturers don't put dimples on golf balls because it looks good. There is real science behind their use. Now follows the lecture. A flat or irregular object moves



through the air in an inconsistent, fluctuating manner because of how air flows over it. So, golf balls without dimples would travel unpredictably through the air. Essentially, golfers would have little hope of controlling a smooth golf ball.

When dimples are added, it creates a tiny layer of air around the ball that significantly cuts down drag. This forces the air to flow over a larger portion of the ball, which results in as much smoother ball flight. (Note; dimple science doesn't just work for golf balls, apparently it works for cars too).

Finally, golf balls have dimples for the purpose of lift. As much as half of the lift a golf ball receives is caused by a backwards spinning motion. When a ball spins backwards, the air pressure under it is greater than above it, so the ball rises in the air. Dimples magnify this effect, contributing as much as 50% of the total lift.

When did golf balls get dimples?



It seems that the invention of golf ball dimples happened accidentally. In the mid -1800s, the most widely-used golf balls were known as gutties, created by using moulded tree sap from the gutta tree, found in the tropics. When golfers inevitably dinged up these balls, they found that the damaged ones had more consistent flight than the new, undamaged balls.

After that discovery, golf ball makers began etching raised protrusions into balls. In the early 1900s, another inventor found that indentations in golf balls performed far better than raised protrusions. In 1905, an English manufacturer, William Taylor, registered a patent for a golf ball dimple design. Before long, all golf balls featured dimples that would be more or less recognizable today.

As ball technology advanced, so too did dimple science. In the modern era, dimple patterns are thoroughly tested using high-tech equipment to find the optimal design for distance and control.

To be continued, where answers to those questions that you no doubt will want addressed. For example, how big are dimples on golf balls, how much does a golf ball weigh and more fascinating information about that golfing essential, the ball.
