FROM THE PRESIDENT



In this my first message for *Links*, I want to start by thanking the members who attended the AGM. It was wonderful to be back in the Club after such a long period. We had a new board elected and the following positions were filled.

Cindy Brown – President, Sharon Johnson – Treasurer Jo Cunningham – Secretary Barbara Oliver – Director Dermot Duncan – Director Ralph Grayden - Director

There is still a vacant position on the Board so if any member feels they have time to contribute, please come forward. I also encourage you all to contact any of the Directors if you have concerns or questions as we intend to be open and transparent with members on all issues facing the Club.

Currently there are two important matters that the Board is negotiating with Lane Cove Council. We have drafted a Heads of Agreement to document all the aspects of our financial relationship with Council. They have replied this week with some amendments and we will discuss at our board meeting on the 8th November and set up a meeting with Council.

Council have also brought to our attention that there is discrepancy between the member numbers published in our annual report and the snapshot of members taken early in the financial year which is used to calculate the payment to Council for our Block Booking Times.

There is a clear pattern of 20-30 more members at the end of each financial year and the numbers drop back down in the new year. Council have sought back payment for the difference in the member numbers between these two snapshots for the past four years. We have for several months traded spreadsheets to demonstrate that a significant part of the discrepancy relates to new members taking up the three-month trial period, many of whom never converted. *Continued over*

We have agreed a new process going forward from this year where we will pay a pro rata amount for all new members joining during the year. As the payment process was mutually agreed by both parties for many years, we have argued that it is not reasonable for the Council to now ask for four years of back payment. However, we do recognise that the process has inadvertently resulted in a disadvantage for Council and in a spirit of good relations, we have offered to pay for the FYE 2021 only, the amount that would have been payable if the new process had been in place last year, which at \$5926 is a significant sum for our budget to absorb.

Our main priority, however, is to address the financial deficit from our Clubhouse Operations and the introduction of the Cinnamon Klub restaurant in the evenings is a key element in our strategy to encourage patrons from the local community to support the Club. It is early days, but we are seeing some encouraging numbers from our bar sales that align with restaurant bookings and live music nights. All take away orders or inhouse dining bookings can be made online at www.cinnamonklub.com. If you live locally, please spread the word amongst your friends and come and enjoy a relaxing dinner on the deck.

It is with sadness that we received the resignation of Angela Galipanzo this month. We can't thank Angela enough for her contribution to the Club. Her professionalism and "can do" attitude was evident in her contact with members and function hirers. I know the 9-hole golfers on Wednesday will miss Angela who got her RSA just to be able to serve them. The Club got a face lift thanks to Angela as she painted and decorated to make the Club more appealing to hirers. In true Angela style she has given 8 weeks' notice with her last day being 24th December.

From Monday 8th November, the Public Health Orders will enable us to seat more patrons inside as the "2sqm rule" kicks in. We were fortunate to have played golf all through the lockdown period, but now that we can socialise with each other again and share stories of our rounds, I think we can all appreciate how much being part of a membership community adds to our enjoyment of the sport.

Finally, the Board recently agreed that it would be a good idea to have a single point of Club communications with Green Options, the group which provides the day-to-day maintenance of the course. We have asked Ralph Sadler to take up the role as the touchpoint for members to communicate their suggestions and concerns about the course maintenance that can be relayed to Green Options. Some of the items may be matters for Council to address. It has also been suggested that Ralph establishes contact with the Pro shop on course issues. Members are invited to contact Ralph (ralphsadler@icloud.com) with concerns about the course maintenance. The Board is very grateful to Ralph for taking on this responsibility on top of the many other tasks he performs for the Club.

COVID-19 AND GOLFING BOOM AND BUST?

Editor's note: There is a saying that it is an ill wind that blows nobody any good. Translated, even a very bad situation must have some good results. Clearly, one of the good results of developments during the very bad situation of the NSW Covid-19 lockdown has been the surge in golfing participants and course usage over the period.

Michael Court, below, has taken out some of the figures that highlight this increased usage. The big question now is, will those numbers stay, or will there be a decided downturn as we return to a period of social and golfing normality. Boom and bust?

One club boasts an incredible 159 per cent jump in membership. And that's just a part of a golf membership 'boom' that has come about due to the Covid-19 pandemic in New South Wales. The golfing landscape has changed dramatically in the 18 months as golf has become the real 'go-to' sport with so many other forms of exercise put on the backburners.

Sydney has led the way as many clubs have been forced to close their membership books as tee-times are suddenly at a premium and sharing tee-times with other clubs in other local government areas has become

quite the norm.



It's not just one or two regions either. Club memberships right across the state are at record highs and city clubs are busier than they've ever been. Antill Park at Picton leads the pack as many clubs across Sydney have reported double-digit increases in membership. Their club has had an amazing 26.4 per cent membership increase.

Asquith in Sydney's north is up 15 per cent; Bonnie Doon in Sydney's east is up 14.4 per cent, clubs in the west such as Penrith (24.7 per cent), Cumberland (14.3 per cent) and Fox Hills (14.2 per cent) are also thriving.

In the north-west, the Muirfield club at North Rocks is up (15 per cent), while clubs closer to the city such as Marrickville (up 49.6 per cent in just 12 months), Northbridge (up 35 per cent) and Lane Cove (up 38.5 per cent) also have figures worth bragging about.

Every Golf Club has had a massive increase in memberships. What started as a slight jump in memberships during the state's first lockdown in 2020 has turned into a wave of new memberships this year.

BOOM AND BUST continued

Numbers supplied to Golf NSW from clubs show a jump in memberships of around 6.51 per cent across metropolitan Sydney and 6.4 per cent in regional New South Wales.

The largest percentage increase across NSW was recorded by Teven Golf Club in the state's far north. Redesigned by Craig Parry, the impressive nine-hole course in the Ballina-Byron Shire now boasts a membership of 386, a jump of 159 per cent in the past 12 months. "We opened the books in December, and within six days, membership went from 176 to more than 300," said Teven's co-owner Nicki Gumbleton. "We closed the books in January and gave ourselves a breather, but then we let another 100 in; membership is almost at 400 now, with a waiting list! "Most of the members are from the Ballina/Byron shire. "Members coming through the door every day keep us going."

Regional clubs south of Sydney have also reported sizeable increases. Gerringong (20.8 per cent), Worrigee Links (20.86 per cent) and Jamberoo (34.17 per cent) have led the Illawarra surge. Further down the coast, Moruya (10.7 per cent) almost doubled the state average. The story is much the same in the state's north, with Kempsey (13.4 per cent), Nambucca Heads (9.3 per cent), Sawtell (7 per cent) all seeing a boost in members.

Among the other club numbers of note Duntry league in the central west, is up 14 per cent, Rich River Golf Club on the Murray, up 18 per cent, and The Vintage in the Hunter Valley has seen its membership increase by 26 per cent.
