The Board have some good news stories to share in this final edition of *Links* for 2021.

The DA for the Council's sport and recreation facility has been removed from the agenda of the Sydney North Planning Panel for 7th December. So far, no explanation has been provided for why it has been dropped, but it would seem that someone in a position of authority has realised that it is more appropriate to delay this decision until after the results of the Council election have been clarified.

Last month we shared our disappointment that our Functions Manager Angela Galipanzo, had given us notice of resignation. The Health Orders are scheduled to be re-adjusted on 15th December. Patrons will still need to check-in, and it is the Club's policy that we will continue to only allow double vaccinated patrons to enter the clubhouse.

On 28th November, a group of our members gave many hours of hard yakka to clean out the rubbish behind the old pro shop building, with stunning results. The Club has no responsibility for anything to do with the pro shop, so this was a pure gesture of community spirit to improve the environment and to send a message to Council that perhaps the old building could be useable. CAPTAIN'S CORNER

Well, we are now at the end of what has been a tumultuous year for everyone, not only in their personal lives, but in all our golfing lives as well. Let's hope all is settling down and we can all enjoy a quiet 2022. Now, a couple of events and issues to mention in what is our last *Links* for 2021.

Firstly, a couple of weeks ago we had to play with the white markers missing on a couple of tees. Apparently, we were victims of vandalism, and several markers and flags were stolen.



Some members asked where they should tee the ball if white markers were not in place. Simple – if the markers are missing, you tee off from the white plates permanently embedded in the ground for that hole. For example – if the markers are missing on the 4^{th} hole, you should tee off at the white plates for the 4^{th} hole. The only reason not to do this is if there are two sets of white markers on the 13^{th} tee.

Same for the 9th / 18th holes. If the white markers are missing on the 18th hole, you should tee off from the plates for the 18th hole, unless there are two sets of white markers on the 9th tee.

Another issue is the booking of timeslots, mainly on Saturdays. I note some members like to book right at the end of the time sheet even though there are several spare lines above them. It would be a great benefit to everyone if those late starters would "push" up their booking to just behind the group before them.


There are a couple of reasons for this.

- 1. Members of the Committee on board duty, must wait for the last group to finish before they can close the comp. I don't think it is very fair to ask Committee members to wait an extra 20 30 minutes for the last group to finish
- 2. On a Saturday our last group are expected to start playing the turn around 10^{th} hole no later than 2.30pm. Starting your round earlier at say 12.15 gives you plenty of time to turn at the 10^{th} hole and not have problems with public players hitting off just behind us, or, in some cases, being inserted in the field before our members have completed their round.

Now, details about a couple of events coming up.

Everyone would have received an email about our "informal" AGM on Wednesday 8th December.

Attendance at AGMs in the past few years have not been great, so the Committee have decided to make it informal, after golf. So, if any member wishes to discuss any issue, that would be the time to do so. Our financial reports will be available for anyone wishing to peruse them and there will be a chance for anyone





With so little time to organise our normal **Legacy Day**, the Committee decided to just make it a simple straightforward "donation" day to support Legacy once again. The event will be held on **Saturday 11th December.**
