FROM THE PRESIDENT



I am sure most of you would be aware that Lane Cove Council passed a motion at an extraordinary meeting on Monday 28 February to formally withdraw the DA for the Golf Precinct Development proposal from the Sydney North Planning Panel.

This is a welcome relief for our Club, as it removes the imminent danger of a development that would be highly detrimental to our course and our clubhouse amenity.

The primary motivation for the councillors in this vote was related to the recently published business case for the project, and that four indoor courts was an insufficient benefit for a high development cost.

However, our voice was heard in the debate. I spoke at the regular Council meeting on 21st February, and I was joined by Rosemary Hurford, who refreshed the councillors' memories of the community consultation outcome. Dermot Duncan spoke last Monday.

The Council also voted to expedite the timetable to resolve the problem of providing much needed indoor sports facilities, possibly at the golf course location, but also possibly at another location. Workshops are on the agenda, and we will be proactive in representing the interests of the Club and all users of the course whenever we have an opportunity for input.

In other news, the Board has established a third golf committee for the management of Junior players. We have revised the terms and conditions associated with junior membership to restrict their access to the full competition program until they have demonstrated that they have the appropriate skills, knowledge and maturity to participate.

The committee is working on a pathway for juniors that will include a supervised "juniors only" competition and knowledge tests. My thanks to Ralph Graydon for heading up this committee, which also includes Lisa Blackwell, Tony Happell, Kasey Dive and myself.

It is more than ten days since I last played golf (9 holes in the rain) and I am feeling the withdrawal pain of a seasoned addict. Surely the rain has to end sometime soon, and we can enjoy a balmy autumn on the course.

CAPTAIN'S CORNER



Well, we certainly have had our fair share of rain over the last couple of weeks and unfortunately it has badly affected our golfing programme. If possible, we will send you an email if we are aware that the course is closed. But sometimes that is not possible and you may have to contact the pro shop to find out the state of the course. You may also, but not always find this information on our website.

All members should have received an email about the programme changes, especially in relation to the Singles KO. If you missed out on that email, please contact me and I will send you a copy. For those still in the KO, please remember that if the course is open, the match must be played. Being a little wet is not a reason to postpone a match.

Once again slow play is becoming an issue. I know I mention this issue a lot, but some members just don't get it. Slow play especially by morning groups affect the whole day. Late afternoon groups end up having public being inserted into the field in front of them. So please consider other members and remember "your place in the field is just behind the group in front and not just in front of the group behind".

It has become a concern for the Committee about how some members have been applying the rules of golf. It appears some members just make a "best guess" without actually referring to, or knowing, the rules. Recently all members were sent a copy of the latest new and amended rules and hopefully everyone has read and digested these changes.

The Club has copies of the Rules of Golf book, and should anyone require a copy, please ask a member of the Committee and refer to the publication when any dispute arises. Don't forget, if you can't resolve the matter, you should talk to the Committee to find the answer.

One area that has caused confusion recently is just when a provisional ball may be played. A provisional ball may be

played if you believe your ball is lost outside a penalty area or may be out of bounds.

If you decide to play a provisional ball, you <u>must</u> inform your marker that you intend to do so and you must play that provisional ball <u>before</u> you go forward to search for the original ball. You cannot go forward to search for your original ball and then decide to play a provisional.

Should you fail to inform your marker that you are playing a provisional ball, the provisional ball, when hit, will become your ball in play and the original ball is considered lost (even if you find it).

Also, if you play a provisional and then go forward and find your original within the 3-minute allowed time, the original ball is your ball in play and the provisional must be abandoned.

Also please remember the time limit for searching is 3 minutes only!

Providing the rain stops, we have a couple of major events for members to look forward to in the next couple of months. The Centennial Cup and Nic Corish Memorial Day are on the agenda, and we will give more information about those in next month's issue of Links.

Let's hope we can all get back on the course asap.


