CAPTAIN'S CORNER

Well, here we are back into another golfing year and with the weather cooperating, it is great to be back out on the course.

Some things to catch up on. Firstly, the draw for the Singles KO is now on the noticeboard and as has been mentioned many times, we cannot allow postponement of matches this year. I'm sure everyone will remember the problems we had finishing the 4 Ball KO last year because of postponements. – No-one's fault, but the atrocious weather meant it was impossible to play matches on time.

All matches must be played on time. Ensure you find out who you are playing and arrange your match accordingly.

We are not playing the Gold Medal this year. This is normally played in conjunction with the February Medal between the winners of any Medal the previous year. However, with so few medals played last year the Committee decided not to play the Gold Medal this year.

One thing I must remind members about is that they must submit a fully completed and correct scorecard after each round. During COVID and the wet weather last year, we allowed some simple errors in scoring to slip by, but that will no longer be the case. The Committee have already disqualified some members for lodging incorrect scorecards so please check your card carefully.

For those who use the Miscore app to enter results, a reminder that you <u>MUST</u> fill out and submit a fully completed scorecard to be eligible to win any competition. You must also check your score in the computer after the round to ensure it is correct.



Recently one of our members, playing at another course, did not check the computer and somehow had incorrectly registered a hole in one on a Par 5. If there is any dispute as to a player's score, the Committee will always go to the scorecard to resolve the dispute. No scorecard - no win.

With our reduced level of membership, the size of our fields has reduced somewhat. That has not stopped slow play creeping back as a problem. Please remember your slow play affects every group behind you.

The flow on effect of an early morning group being slow is felt throughout the day with some of our later groups encountering public players trying to hit off as well as our last few groups finishing much later than they should. Please be considerate to other players. Good Golfing.

From the editor. I have been a Peanuts fan from my youth in the 1950s. Please indulge me in what I have designated as the Snoopy Special. I hope you enjoy the examples of some gentle, whimsical Schulz humour.

The First "Peanuts" cartoon debuted in 1950, the good-natured antics of Charlie Brown, Snoopy and their friends have brought laughter and comfort to generations of readers. Peanuts" was loved and trusted by diverse audiences, and Charles M Schulz used its unique appeal as a unifying and educational tool during a time of considerable cultural change.

During its nearly half-century run, golf was a frequent theme of the comic strip. That owed much to the fact that its creator, Charles M. Schulz, had a lifelong passion for the game. He played on his high school golf team and caddied the summer after graduation at his neighborhood course. Later in life, he enjoyed a weekly foursome with his friends, maintained a Handicap Index of 10, and competed in several Pebble Beach National Pro-Ams.

Through Schulz's commitment to making the world, and golf, a better place, his "Peanuts" characters, particularly the basset hound, Snoopy, continue to connect readers to new subjects and impactful initiatives.
