FROM THE PRESIDENT



The heat rolls on.....we seem to be living a case of "be careful what you wish for" as the summer we so desperately missed last year keeps on delivering heat and humidity and we collapse into the clubhouse with red faces and parched mouths.

The Council's DA is due to be assessed by the Sydney North Planning Panel on March 15th. I will update members as soon as I am advised of the outcome. Over the last few months, I have provided detailed submissions to the architects on our needs and am hopeful that these will have been taken into consideration in the detailed design

process.

In the meanwhile, Council have set up a series of meetings in the next fortnight to discuss the logistics of playing golf during the construction period. This edition will go to print before any of these meetings occur, so I can give no details, but it is surely a good sign the Council is keen to workshop the various issues with ourselves, the Pro Shop, the greenkeepers and Kasey Dive.

I am very aware that members are wondering about the future and looking at alternative clubs. I encourage you to remain positive that Lane Cove Golf Club will continue to operate our normal competition schedule and that we will be able to offer an attractive membership deal for the financial year beginning July 2023. The Council has acknowledged that the price we pay for our BBT will be reliant on the level of facilities that they will provide, and this is what we are about to negotiate. As we will no longer be supporting the running of an aging clubhouse, our own overheads will be greatly reduced, thus the annual membership fee will certainly be significantly lower than the last two years.

Our arrangement with the Cinnamon Klub restaurant will come to an end on the first weekend of April, when daylight saving finishes. We have given notice to Kailash Bhandari that we will be no longer be opening in the evening except by prior arrangement for functions and we would like to publicly thank him for the huge effort he has put into making the restaurant a success. Our priority in the next few months is to be open at times that are frequented by golfing members.

I would like to remind all members that they need to use their bar tab balance, or they will lose it. These can be used for food or drinks. Any balances remaining when we close our doors in June will not be refundable.

One simple error made on the cards is to not clearly mark which column of scores relate to which player. Unless you identify at the top of the column the name of the player whose scores are in that column the committee may be placed in a position where they have no option but to disqualify that member or group.

The course has been in great condition lately with only the bunkers out of play on some days. Members should make sure they check the conditions of play posted each day on the noticeboard outside the pro shop.

For the last few months, we have played "preferred lie through the green" but with the course condition improving we may change that soon to "preferred lie fairways only". Make sure you don't get caught preferring your ball in the rough when the change is made.

MEN'S GOLF (Backy's Blurb)

GREETINGS ALL.

Singles Knockout Matchplay has commenced with results to follow.

Matchplay is golf in its purest and most original form. Before there was a standardized 18 Hole configuration, or even 'Par' for that matter, Matchplay was the only competition played between two opponents.

Players would head for the 'Links' (the disused or land useless for farming, perched between the 'good' land and the sea) where a course layout had been set.

The Tee may be found atop a sand dune, flattened at the top. There being no Tees invented at that stage (the early 1900's, when the Reddy Tee, a wooden peg we are all familiar with appeared) a small mound of sand was permitted to place one's ball on for your first shot.

The first kind of ball was a Feathery, a leather pouch stuffed full of boiled feathers. It is said a top hat full of feathers was crammed into the pouch. Superseding that was the Gutty-Percha, a hard rubber ball sourced from the same named South American rubber tree. These were very expensive so often a 'Fore caddy' was sent forward to observe where the ball landed. Thus, the origin of calling FORE!

Players would play matchplay over however many holes there were. Halving holes in a 10 was not uncommon! Some things have never changed! *Continued over*
