FROM THE PRESIDENT



The Council's DA has now been passed by the Sydney North Planning Panel. Unfortunately, they chose not to apply the conditions that we were seeking to guarantee both the course and access to the 9th fairway, but at least we gave it our best shot.

There is now one decision point remaining. The tenders for the building construction are due to be received on Monday 26th June. If the prices are within the set budget, the project will definitely proceed to demolition. If the prices are in excess of that budget, there will be no demolition of the clubhouse or tennis courts and the project will return to the councillors for a decision. The Council believes

they can still receive the \$5 million grant money by doing some site establishment within June.

We had set a clubhouse closing date of Sunday 11th June, so that we could responsibly dispose of our assets in the timeframe initially requested by Council. The Board have now decided to push this date back to Sunday 25th June as we cannot proceed with asset disposal until we are sure that the demolition will proceed and we may as well enjoy our clubhouse for a little longer. Council will allow us extra time into July to complete our shutdown.

I would remind members that they need to use the money in their bar tabs before the clubhouse closes or they will lose it.

The Council is working on a plan to establish the infrastructure to transfer the start of play to the 3rd Tee by 30th June. This will include -

- installation of temporary greenkeeping facilities at the beginning of the 1st fairway
- installation of a temporary pro shop building at the 3rd
- moving of our members' equipment shed to the 3rd
- provision of power and internet to these buildings
- temporary toilets in the park on Gamma Road
- construction of a safe pathway down the hill behind the 11th green down to the temporary pro shop.

Council have also given notice of two other on-course projects. They have found funds to replace the bridge over the gully from the men's 2ndtee and they also need to allow the development at 4 Northwood Road to implement a stormwater drainage solution across the 1st fairway. Now that they have firmed their plan for the greenkeeping equipment to be re-housed on the 1st fairway, they are proposing to build the temporary tee for the 1st in conjunction with these other activities. This temporary tee will be 105 metres from the green and will be in place for the duration of the construction period. The proposed date for this work is Monday 29th May. Please note that the new 1st tee to be built after the building Is completed is expected to be 160 metres from the green.

The Board are resolving the details of our membership offer for the year beginning July 2023 and will be circulating this by email.

Finally, I am saddened to hear of the passing of Hamish Anderson, one of the true characters of our Club. My introduction to playing in competition was with Hamish and Doug Cameron in the Sunday Medley and I have fond memories of those rounds. I expect to see many members present at the Club on Friday to bid him farewell.

VALE HAMISH (JAMES) ANDERSON



Check out the names on the men's Hole-in-One honour boards. Guess whose name appears there more than any member of the Club in its 60-year history..................James Hamish Anderson - SIX holes-in-one.

Proudly Scottish in background, 24-year member Hamish was an accomplished bagpipes player. Many would remember Hamish piping the pros to the shootout hit off point on the Club's Pro-Am annual day. At St Andrews Church at Longueville, he readily assisted by piping in the Haggis for the St Andrews Day luncheons on more than one occasion.

Formal positions held at various times and years included membership of the Board, Membership of the Men's Golf Committee, several times at the same time as a Board Director, Membership of the Pro-Am Committee.

In 2012, after a successful State Government grant of +\$20,000 was won by the Club for the provision of a wheelchair toilet in the clubhouse, Hamish assumed responsibility for the project, and he made good use of his professional skills as an engineer in taking on the planning, and then managing the associated building work.

Hamish did the same with the installation of another grant, from Golf NSW, the Members' shed, which allowed members to store their clubs as well as charging buggy batteries. Once again Hamish did the bulk of the work with labouring help from one less qualified. I wonder how many users noticed a plaque on this shed acknowledging Hamish's contribution! It could now be renamed the Hamish Anderson memorial shed in the little time left before it is moved, or before we lose it to the forthcoming demolition!

Before the time slot slipped off our block booking time, Hamish took responsibility for looking after the Sunday medley competition. This was a fun event and was instrumental in producing a number of new members whose first golfing experience was with the medley.

For some years Hamish worked with me on a weekly basis as we counted and recorded the diminishing takings from the Club's poker machine usage, with never an error in the balancing of the books. This task became a fortnightly then monthly one as use of the machines declined significantly prior to their removal from the Club several years ago.

He was frequently the first to raise his hand for any jobs that needed doing. I can think of no other member who so regularly volunteered for jobs around the Club. Hamish was always available and sometimes he may have over committed himself to the many tasks in a club such as ours which relied so much on volunteer support.

No matter how difficult the task, he had a go! I wonder how many members of our Club can make the same claim about their contribution to the Club.

Hamish, bantam sized, (he had played scrum half for Eastwood rugby club), was a fierce, sometimes aggressive protector of the course itself, and he was sometimes seen in "discussions" with members of the public taking advantage of our course and using it for practice, often damaging it, and failing to repair divots or pitch marks.

Can there have been a more assiduous finder/collector of golf balls? He had a collection running in to the thousands and he made a point of returning balls with identification marks to their owners across the years. I was a grateful regular received

Hamish was very stringent on golf rules and associated personal discipline, and he would not tolerate carelessness in this regard with the result that he occasionally had altercations with members of the public not supervising their children. And sometimes with members as well!

Probably because of some of the above, Hamish was given the nickname The Sherriff, a name he was not always happy with as it hinted at an element of disparagement by some members who failed to appreciate Hamish's contribution to the Club, and who certainly did not go close to matching the commitment Hamish made.

Hamish was a fine golfer, reaching the playing status of a middle-ranked B Grader. He represented the Club on many occasions as a member of the Warren and Gibson teams. If not playing, whenever the Club entertained visiting clubs for pennant matches, Hamish could always be found tucked away as a "spotter" on the 2nd fairway.

Hamish leaves an unparalleled legacy of support and commitment as a proud member of our Club through generous volunteer participation, both on and off the course. At times irascible, at times difficult, at times irritating and at times pedantic, actions sometimes got heated. However, always his intentions were honourable and as remarked by Life Member Helen Prentice, his heart was in the right place......!

He used to practice a lot and hit a low rakish draw which I believe is the reason for his remarkable record of hole in ones. The ball has a much better chance of holing out if rolling towards the hole as opposed to coming in from on high, I believe and his 6 hole in ones, accompanied by his standard ball flight goes a long way towards proving my point.
